The book that you are holding in your hands is a further entry in a series of volumes that aspires to make some of the ideas presented at the annual international symposium Logica permanently accessible to both the conference participants and the wider public.

Last year's symposium, which took place at Hejnice Monastery in the Czech Republic from June 19 to June 23, 2017, brought together scholars from many different countries. This volume contains a representative sample of the contributions made at the conference. The Logica symposium is an event with a long tradition, as it was first held in 1987. The symposium is open to researchers of both a mathematical and a philosophical bent.

The informal atmosphere provides a space for a stimulating exchange of ideas among logicians of all generations, including students. As the editors of this volume we are proud that we can contribute to the successful completion of the annual symposium cycle by presenting this collection to you.
